Earth day this year is Monday, April 22nd. It is not a day we typically celebrate in the church, but as stewards of God's world, we are called to cherish and protect the Earth and honor the interconnectedness of all life.

By using the principles of stewardship in our daily lives and advocating for positive change, we

can contribute to the flourishing of humanity and nature, and work toward a more sustainable and equitable future for us and our planet we call home.

Stewardship of our earth is something we can easily teach our children. Parents play a crucial role in instilling values and shaping the worldview of their children. Teaching children about being good stewards of God's world involves integrating environmental awareness with spiritual teachings and practical actions. Here are some ways parents can share this important lesson:

Lead by Example: Children learn by observing their parents.
 Demonstrate environmentally responsible behaviors in your daily life, such as recycling, conserving water and energy, gardening,

and supporting sustainable practices. Let your children see you making eco-friendly choices and explain why these actions are important.

- Connect Nature with Spirituality: Help your children develop
 a sense of reverence and awe for the natural world by exploring
 the spiritual aspects of nature. Spend time outdoors together,
 whether it's hiking in the woods, visiting a botanical garden, or
 simply playing in the backyard. Use these experiences to discuss
 how God's creation reflects His love and wisdom.
- 3. **Integrate Faith-Based Teachings**: Incorporate relevant scriptures, stories, and teachings into discussions about environmental stewardship. You might explore passages about God's role as Creator and humanity's responsibility to care for the Earth such as Genesis 1:26-28 and Psalm 24:1.
- 4. Engage in Meaningful Conversations: Encourage open dialogue with your children about environmental issues and their implications. Discuss current events related to climate change, pollution, wildlife conservation, and social justice. Help children understand how their actions, no matter how small, can make a positive impact on the world.

Plant a garden together, visit a local farm or nature reserve, volunteer for environmental clean-up efforts, or participate in community gardening projects.
- 6. Practice Gratitude: Cultivate a spirit of gratitude in your children by encouraging them to appreciate the gifts of nature and express thankfulness for the beauty and abundance around them. Encourage daily practices such as saying prayers of gratitude before meals or keeping a gratitude journal where they can reflect on the blessings of God's creation.

By incorporating these strategies and your own ideas, children can learn and experience how to be good stewards of God's world, and nurture a deep sense of responsibility, compassion, and reverence for the Earth and all who live in it.

Bridges to Recovery is a MCGHA facility, operating as a peer-run recovery center, providing a hub for multiple prevention, treatment, recovery resources, and service connections. Marinette County Group Home Association (MCGHA) strives to provide supervised housing and treatment to clients who require assistance with mental, cognitive, and physical aspects of their lives to obtain optimal quality of life; through the operation of three facilities, each of which serves adults with mental illness and/or alcohol and drug use.





Did you know...

that we have two groups that pray for those with various kinds of needs? We have a Prayer Chain of people who pray on their own when they get the notice via phone call. We have a Prayer Group that gathers almost every Wednesday morning at 9:30 AM to pray together for people.

Whom do they pray for? Those who are sick or injured, going in for surgery, facing death, grieving the loss of a loved one, dealing with a big decision in their life, traveling, waiting for text results, in need of direction from God, etc. In other words, whenever they get a request to pray, they pray. In the Bible, in James 5:16, it says, "The prayer of the faithful is powerful and effective." Prayer brings healing and connects us to God and to one another.

If something comes up in your life or in the life of a friend or loved one that needs prayer, please contact the church office with the prayer request. Prayer requests will be kept confidential to the Prayer Chain and/or Prayer Group, if requested when you call. We give thanks for those who are willing to pray for people, especially for those serving on these two prayer teams in the church!
